
## Students will have opportunity to:


- Step into the shoes of local aviation pioneers.
- Experience the thrill of early flight in wood and fabric biplanes.
- Engage with authentic artefacts, primary texts and imagery from a wide range of eras including WWI & WWII.
- Connect with key moments in Australian history through large scale imagery and original film footage.
- See large scale artefacts, aircraft, engines and propellers and learn first hand about these technologies.
- Go behind the scenes at the restoration workshop and see the skill and technology required to rebuild aircraft.

Celebrating Warbird Aircraft and the history of aviation in the Upper Hunter Region







## **Investigate and learn**

Thematic discussion questions targeting key themes in the exhibition, have been developed by the exhibition curatorial team to assist your students to get the most from their exhibition experience.

#### **Across themes**

- Throughout history, aviation has played an important role in Australia's war efforts. What role did aircraft play in the outbreak of war? How did this change between the First World War and present day?
- How has aviation and the increasing accessibility of flight over the past 100 years influenced and shaped Australian society and the way we live our lives?



## **Investigate and learn**

## Case study

Compare propaganda posters from WWI and WWII. What techniques were used by the government to encourage people to enlist and contribute to the war effort?

In groups, students can use a poster as a starting point to carry out an investigation into the contribution of the artist to the war effort. Use critical thinking, analysis and literal comprehension. How did the artist use imagery and text to convey their message? What design elements of the poster (colour, typography etc) have been successful in conveying this message?



## Fighter Aces

## **Thematic Description**

Fighters pushed the limits of piston-engine aircraft performance between 1914 and 1945.

Evolving from wood and fabric biplanes to all-metal monoplanes, pilots tested this new technology and themselves in combat. They were supported by engineers, test pilots and aircraft factory workers including many women. In 1940, a small band of RAF fighter pilots defeated the Luftwaffe during the Battle of Britain, a turning point in the ultimate downfall of Nazi Germany.

'Fighter Tales' showcases the evolution of aerial warfare through an array of aircraft, introducing important figures with links to the Hunter Region, and celebrating their contributions to the aerial war effort.











## **Investigate and learn**Fighter Tales

#### 1914-1945

- In what ways did the Australian Flying Corps assist in the aerial warfare effort during World War I?
- How did the Hunter community support the war effort during World War I and World War II?
- What impact did the Australian Air Force have on the course of the Second World War?
- How did the Second World War alter Australia's relationship with Britain and the United States?

## Case study

The aircraft and diorama on display in "Fighter Tales" provide students with an overview of how aircraft technology and the use of aircraft in warfare evolved between 1914 and 1945. Study the different skills pilots would have had to learn as well as learning to fly, for example aerial photography. What impact did the First and Second World Wars have on aircraft and did this influence the development of other technologies?



## Hit My Smoke

## **Thematic Description**

During the Vietnam War, 36 RAAF fighter pilots served on rotation with the US Air Force as Forward Air Controllers flying small aircraft including the Cessna O-1 to search for targets in thick jungle at low altitude. They marked a location with smoke rockets for an air strike by jet aircraft patrolling overhead, remaining in the area to guide further strikes if required.

Fifteen RAAF FAC pilots received the Distinguished Flying Cross. Australian Army pilots flew the similar Cessna 180 in Vietnam on dangerous low-level reconnaissance flights.











## **Investigate and learn**Hit My Smoke

#### 1962-1972

- How did the advancement of military aviation after the Second World War influence Australia's role in Vietnam?
- Forward Air Controllers were specially trained aviators who had to master numerous tactics as well as undertaking the formidable challenges of combat aviation. What was their specific role in the Vietnam war?
- Discuss the climate and terrain of Vietnam. How does this differ to Australia and what challenges would this have meant for Australian pilots?

## Case study

The Vietnam War was different in nature to previous wars Australia had been involved in. Pilots flew at low altitude in an intimidating operational environment. Have a look at the aircraft on display. The Cessna O-1 carries only smoke rockets with no weapons or defensive counter measures. Why was this unusual for a military aircraft and what would this have meant for the people who flew them?



## **Quiet Heroes**

## Thematic description

Aviation is demanding and success requires commitment. For over a century, ordinary Australians have risen to the many challenges of flight and have made history along the way.

This portion of the exhibition showcases a collection of pilots from the Hunter Region, providing a summary of their life and achievements in the aviation field. Students are able to learn about a wide range of individuals who are all linked through a passion for piloting Australian Warbirds, through large scale graphics, artefacts and multimedia.











## **Investigate and learn Quiet Heroes**

## 1914-Present Day

- Aviation was an attractive pursuit as becoming a pilot was perceived as a glamorous role. Analyse the wall of people in "Humble Heroes". What type of people became pilots? Discuss their similarities and differences.
- How has the training of pilots changed between World War I and present day?
- What impact did the Second World War have on aviation and society in Australia?

### Case study

Mardi Gething was a remarkable woman who undertook dangerous work throughout the Second World War. During her time spent in the Air Transport Auxiliary, she flew 233 Spitfires and went on to join the Australian Women's Pilots Association after the war. Discuss how the role of women changed with World War II including the Women's Auxiliary Australian Air Force (WAAF) and the impact on the women's movement in Australia. How did this pave the way for future female military and civilian pilots?



## **Fightertown**

## Thematic description

Known as 'Fightertown', Williamtown RAAF Base near Newcastle has been the home of RAAF fighter pilot training since the 1940s. Generations of RAAF fighter pilots have honed their skills over the Hunter Valley and today it is the location for the introduction of the F-35A Joint Strike Fighter into RAAF service.

During emergencies such as the 1955 Maitland floods, Williamtown also became the centre for rescue and relief operations.











## **Investigate and learn** Fightertown

## 1941-Present Day

- How has the RAAF assisted in relief missions in the Hunter Valley?
- How did the development of Air to Air Missiles impact the Cold War and what was the impact on the RAAF?
- Analyse a fighter pilot uniform. Can you guess what each piece of equipment is used for? How have pilot uniforms changed over the last 100 years?

## Case study

Williamtown is home to the RAAF's main fighter base where generations of fighter pilots have honed their skills, flying over the Hunter Valley. Have you ever seen a fighter aircraft fly above you? Although they are trained to defend our nation, often the RAAF provide outreach and relief missions within the local community. Can you think of examples where the RAAF supported Australian citizens in times of need?



## **Earning Your Wings**

## **Thematic Description**

Learning to fly is the first challenge for any aspiring aviator. Going solo and earning your wings is a great achievement but as any pilot will tell you, its just the start of a journey of discovery where you never stop gaining wisdom from experience in the air.

'Earning Your Wings' showcases the opportunities that becoming a pilot can offer, and explores the stories of ordinary Australians becoming wartime heroes.

A spotlight is also placed on the people on the ground, who worked tirelessly to maintain these Warbirds, and provide adequate training to the thousands of pilots that were needed to sustain a successful Air Force.











## **Investigate and learn Earning Your Wings**

#### 1939-1945

- What was the Empire Air Training Scheme and how did it impact Australia and the RAAF?
- Aside from learning to fly, what skills and adventures would pilots joining the RAAF in the 1940's experienced?
- Training bases and factories were vital to maintain and repair aircraft during the war. What were some of the jobs performed by women at these bases?

## **Case Study**

Encourage students to think about things that fly. Can they group them into different types: those that are man made or natural? Discuss Bernoulli's principle and study the aircraft in front of you. Aircraft can achieve lift because of the shape of its wings. They are shaped so that air flows faster over the top of the wing and slower underneath. Fast moving air equals low air pressure while slow moving air equals high air pressure. The high air pressure underneath the wings therefore pushes the aircraft up through the lower air pressure.



## **Legacy in Flight**

## Thematic description

Col Pay pioneered both aerial agriculture and vintage military aircraft restoration in Australia. Established in 1978, Vintage Fighter Restorations at Scone has an international reputation based on long experience in returning rare World War II fighters to the air. The collection of historic aircraft Col Pay established continues to grow under the care of his son Ross.

Hundreds of thousands of military aircraft were manufactured during World War II. Those that survived the conflict were usually scrapped and very few remain today.

Restoration involves the total rebuilding of an aircraft and is one way to preserve traditional engineering skills which are now disappearing as aeronautical technology changes.











## **Investigate and learn**Legacy in Flight

- What was Col's contribution to aerial agriculture and how has this influenced that industry in Australia today?
- What legacy did Col leave for the Australian Warbird community and next generation of pilots?
- On average, how long does it take to restore a Warbird and what are some of the skills required to do so?

### Case study

Hundreds of thousands of aircraft were made during the Second World War. Many didn't survive the conflict, and those that did were often scrapped, so today only a rare few remain. Study the D3A 'Val' Bomber and discuss the merits of conserving and restoring this aircraft for future generations. What do you think is the most difficult part of restoration an aircraft?




#### **Authentic Artefacts**

The exhibition showcases artefacts that are inextricably linked to the history of Hunter Warbirds, giving students the opportunity to engage with authentic objects, and understand their significance in the evolution of aviation from WWI to the current day.

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
#### **Aircraft Simulators**

Two aircraft simulators are available in the hangar, a Spitfire and a Bristol Fighter. As well as being an important training tool for pilots, simulators provide visitors with a multi-sensory experience of flying in a Warbird, where they are able to sit in the cockpit and immerse themselves in an audiovisual display.

Simulators can be booked in addition to the general admission tickets.








## **Engines**

## **Aircraft Models**

A collection of scale aircraft models are on display, showcasing the many Warbirds that are a part of Australia's aviation history. Model aircraft allow students to view the planes from new perspectives, and build on their understanding of how Warbirds are designed and manufactured.







#### **Timeline Element**

The timeline element within the exhibition act as a thread, linking each thematic area, helping the visitor make this transition through time and giving an opportunity for cultural context and reflection. The timelines have been developed to depict key moments in Australian Warbird history, and celebrate the role of the Hunter people in supporting military and civil aviation during times of war and peace, from WWI to present day.
